# FG GIVES LAGOS SHORELINE DEVELOPERS ONE MONTH TO REGULARIZE

The Federal Government has issued a one-month ultimatum to developers on the Lagos shoreline to regularize their developments or risk revocation and demolition.

The ultimatum was given by the Minister of Housing and Urban Development, Arc. Ahmed Musa Dangiwa, during an inspection of the Lagos Lagoon Estates and shoreline front.

The disclosure was contained in a statement published on the official website of the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development.

The Minister, on an official visit to Lagos State, was accompanied by the Permanent Secretary, Dr. Marcus Ogunbiyi, and other ministry officials.

He highlighted the need for shoreline developments to comply with existing laws, noting that the Federal and Lagos State Governments have agreed to collaborate on ensuring orderly and regulated development.

He also stated that the Federal Government is documenting its assets nationwide for proper management.



# LONDON APPROVES CONSTRUCTION OF JOINTTALLEST TOWER IN WESTERN EUROPE

The City of London Corporation has given the go-ahead for the construction of a 74story office tower that will match the height of The Shard, currently the tallest building in the United Kingdom and Western Europe.

Report informs, citing Financial Times, that the skyscraper, named 1 Undershaft, faced initial opposition from "neighbors," including Bruce Carnegie-Brown, chairman of the Lloyd's of London insurance market.

They argued that the new building would occupy St. Helen's Square, "depriving the City of a very important gathering space." In response, the project's investor, Aroland Holdings, and developer, Stanhope, reduced the size of the ground floor to preserve most of the square at the tower's base.

Standing at an impressive 309.6 meters, 1 Undershaft will precisely match the height of The Shard, which has held the title of Britain's tallest skyscraper since 2012. The Shard, an iconic addition to London's skyline, stands on the opposite bank of the River Thames.

## LAGOS GOVT TO INTRODUCE NEW BUILDING CODE IN 2025

The Lagos State Government has announced plans to introduce a new building code in 2025 aimed at establishing high-performance standards for a sustainable and smart city.

The initiative seeks to align Lagos with international standards by setting regulations for construction design, land use, and building materials to enhance health, safety, and sustainability.

Dr. Olajide Babatunde, Special Adviser to the Governor on e-GIS and Urban Development, revealed this at the Lagos State Executive Council Retreat on the Domestication of the Lagos Building Code, held on Wednesday at Ikeja GRA.

The announcement was conveyed in a statement issued by Gboyega Akosile, Special Adviser on Media and Publicity to the Lagos State Governor.

"We have been working on the domestication of the National Building Code, and by next year, we are going to have our own brand-new Lagos Building Code," Babatunde said.

Babatunde further highlighted that the Lagos State Government has collaborated with professional bodies, academics, market women, and the general public through a participatory approach.

Construction of 1 Undershaft is expected to be completed around 2030.



#### **Fast Fact**

Ikorodu was settled in the 17th century by immigrants from Ijebu land. The area was originally called Okorodu, which means "the farm of the Odu plant". The Odu plant was a vegetable that was used to dye cloth, and early settlers named the area after the abundant plant.
